Midw through the filming, the tunnel was put back into service and trains began thundering through the dweller's living space at regular intervals. How the dwellers coped with these disruptions and changes is chronicled with energy and passion. By 1993, it was decided that the tunnel should be locked for safety reasons - so one of the inhabitants managed to get hold of a copy of the key and took on the role of doorman.

Dree Andrea is an international award-winning filmmaker, who loves to present her films in person. In addition to film, Andrea has written, directed and produced many theatre plays, children's radio plays, TV shows, corporate films and commercials. Her work has been shown in international film festivals and broadcast on television. Raised in the Netherlands, and a resident of New York City for many years, Andrea has recently moved to the Highlands. Her dream is that through having "Art come to Life" we will consider to start "leaving our phones at the door" and build community once again.
